
It's Academic Sixth Grade News

op news for sixth grade has been preparing our students for MSA testing. Each academic subject has been teaching students how to respond to brief constructed responses in reading. while in our connect classes, we have practiced sample MSA test items. We are confident that our students are well prepared and will make their parents and teachers proud of their achievements. On the last day of testing we will celebrate our hard work with an ice cream and movie event. The film, Remember the Titans, serves a dual purpose. We will be rewarding the hard work of our students while laying the ground work for instruction in May on the 50th anniversary of the Supreme Court decision, Brown vs. the Board of Education (BoE). Brown vs. BoE was the decision that marked the end of the "separate but equal" era in our country. Seeing each day how well our diverse student body works together is the true legacy of that decision.

Social Studies

The end of February saw our students learning about the election process in our country. At the end of this day of civics instruction, students participated in a mock presidential election.

Our present unit is ancient China. One of the highlights of this unit will be sixth grade Kite Day. Students will be assigned to study one of the Chinese dynasties. Using the results of this research, students will decorate a handmade kite that will have symbols unique to their dynasty. Just prior to Spring Break, we will have the entire sixth grade flying kites in our field behind the school. Come and watch the festival.

Reading

We are now in our biography unit. Each student is reading a biography and will be preparing a book report presentation at home. In class, we are reading excerpts of biographies. We are reviewing reading strategies, text structures and features as they apply to our biographies. We are also working on analyzing texts and trying to teach a deeper understanding of text which involves inferencing. The students are working on analyzing characters. You should be seeing your student work on vocabulary at home. We will be working on building a stronger vocabulary for the rest of the year.

Science

February brought the beginning of our third unit, Diversity and Adaptations. Students studied biodiversity, classification and variation. We even explored the variety of adaptations organisms have by creating well adapted butterflies for our classroom. "Birds" then swooped in and fed off as many butterflies as possible. Finally we looked at which butterflies

survived and analyzed why they were able to survive the activity. In March, we will end the unit by studying the process of natural selection and designing a fictitious organism and environment.

Mathematics

Math A students have been working with fractions. We have been comparing them with decimals and percents. Our new unit will be on Geometry, where we will work with angle pairs and identify the relationships among their properties. Math B

students just finished the unit on Geometry Relationships and have moved on to Proportion and Reasoning. In this unit, we will develop an understanding of proportions. They will apply strategies for solving problems involving the skills. IM students are working on



Unit 5, which is the Data Analysis unit where we have been creating and interpreting box and whiskers, stem and leaf, scatter plots and other ways of organizing data. All math students have been working hard in preparation for the Math MSA's, which were held on March 1 and March 5 of this year.

English

We are currently in the Triumphs unit. Students are reading about individuals who have achieved triumph in their lives. We are continuing to use major and minor details in our paragraphs and writing multi-paragraph essays. Students have been studying how to write complete sentences with subjects and predicates, and how to correct fragments and run-on sentences. We are also studying adjectives and incorporating them into our writing.

Eighth Grade News

It's official! Eighth graders are beginning their transition to high school. Students have completed the registration process with the guidance counselors from Magruder High School. As the transition process continues, eighth graders are reminded that becoming a ninth grader can be a very difficult adjustment. The best way to prepare for this is to continue with the academic strategies that have led to your success so far: come to class prepared, stay focused in class, complete your homework and study, study, study for your tests. The habits you develop now will carry over into high school. Keep up the good work!

recommending that the students have some sweats here at school so that if they do go outside, they will be warm.


Most of the classes will be in outdoor

Dance is a great way to learn about dances from other cultures, to develop rhythm, to learn proper etiquette when asking another person to dance, to learn how to dance with another person at a social event, and a way to formally express themselves to music.

warrior" mentality when they perform in activities, because just



like adults, children can get injured. A way to help prevent injuries is to encourage your child to exercise throughout the winter months, perform an adequate warm up and cool down/ stretch. If your child does encounter some type of injury, please make sure that he/she has a note and that the specific activities that he/she IS ABLE to do are also included.



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Teach Students To Be Responsible For Their Own Success

Research say that students can learn to achieve. But they must be trained to be responsible and self-motivated.

Here are concrete ways to encourage students to take charge of themselves:

- ❖ Help students figure out what motivates them. What are their needs, goals and incentives?
- ❖ **Don't harass** and nag students. Show them how to establish their own routines and manage big projects by breaking them down into smaller steps.
- ❖ **Give students** choices. They need opportunities to make decisions.
- ❖ Don't get in the way of natural consequences. If you give students the easy way

out of difficult situations, they won't make the connection between their actions and the results.

- ❖ Introduce games to teach the value of having a strategy. Let students see how their efforts are directly related to the results they achieve.
- ❖ Talk about careers with students. Help them link their learning and interests to future iobs.
- ❖ Urge students to read biographies of successful people in various fields. Encourage them to emulate the traits and habits of these people.

Summer Enrichment Opportunity

The Maryland State Department of Education recently announced the schedule of upcoming Maryland Summer Centers for students entering Grades 3 through 12. Summer Center programs offer unique instructional experiences for students who are gifted and talented, and give students the opportunity to work in a setting and with resources not available during the regular school year.

Centers are located throughout the state and offer one- or two-week residential and non-residential programs with a focus on the arts, science, mathematics, technology, and history. Activities are designed to encourage critical thinking, creativity, and problem solving while challenging students

academically. Tuition ranges from \$50 to \$675. A limited number of full and partial scholarships

are available for those who need financial assistance.

The 2004 Maryland Summer Centers brochure and application is available to be looked at in the guidance office. Brochures, application forms, and a video about

Summer Centers may also be found on the website of the Maryland State Department of Education at www.marylandpublicschools.org/summercenters.

Applications must be postmarked by Thursday, April 15, except for Fine Arts Centers, which have earlier deadlines and may require an audition.

Magruder Parent Advisory Committee

Thanks to all who braved the cold to attend the recent meeting of the Parent Advisory Committee in early February! We value your ideas, suggestions, and opinions as a great resource in our common goal to improve communication, implement new initiatives and

enhance the learning environment for all Magruder students.

The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) meets several times a year to discuss issues and concerns, brainstorm new ideas and act as a forum for new initiatives that affect the greater MHS community. It is an informal gathering of parents, administrators and staff, with no set agenda the floor is open to all topics. And although there are few meetings, there is lots of work that goes on "behind the scenes" that culminates in attaining real results.

For example, discussions about parking lot congestion and safety concerns along Muncaster Mill Rd. have resulted in a

study of the issue by MCPS and the Department of Transportation. Proposed changes to the traffic flow and a reconfiguration of both lots are now

being considered, with initial changes to be implemented in the summer of 2004.

Other examples include improved class scheduling in the Spring, better supervision during after school activities, more AP class choices (as well as offering a few AP selections in tenth grade), increased home/school communication via email, and more frequent interims for all students.

However, in order to better serve all MHS students, we need to hear from representatives of all communities, so that we can better understand the issues that confront them. For example, what special challenges face ESOL students and their families, and what can we do to improve communication? What can we do to make it easier for more families to be involved at Magruder and ensure that all of our activities represent the diversity of our entire community? How can we, as parents and school, join together to help families support their students' achievement, including those students who are ineligible and those students who could succeed at more challenging levels?

Although we continue to search for answers to these and many other questions, we need your help and participation! Please come to the next Parent Advisory Committee meeting on Thursday, April 29 at 7:30 p.m. in the MHS media center, and help us to make Magruder an even better place for students to learn!
